

# Literary Devices in a SOAPStone

## Steps to completing your Literary Device section:

- 1.) Choose a strong lit device you frequently annotated for

  - 2.) Select two quotes (10 words or less) in which you used your selected literary device
  - 3.) List a second device that appears in the quote
  - 4.) Analyze the effect of these devices on the reader
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- Literary Device
  - “First example” (citation).
    - 2nd Device.
    - Explanation/analysis of its effect.
  - “Second example” (citation).
    - 2nd Device.
    - Explanation/analysis of its effect.

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## Example from Harper Lee’s *To Kill A Mockingbird*

- Metaphor
  - “Summer was Dill” (Lee 38).
    - Personification
    - To highlight the joy and love both Scout and Jem had for Dill and display to the reader how much the children valued Dill.
  - “Atticus, you are a devil from hell” (Lee 105).
    - Accusatory Tone with a cliché Diction on the word “devil”.
    - To illustrate to the reader of the playful relationship between neighbors Miss Maudie and Atticus.
